COVID latest Guidance



The DfE have advised the following:

- Adults with the symptoms of a respiratory infections, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature.
- Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.
- Adults with a positive Covid-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious. For children and young people under 18 years of age the advice will be 3 days.


Outside

In PE Year 1 have been developing our throwing and catching skills and we have learnt how to sidestep and pivot. We have put these skills together to play small sided invasion games.




We've been so impressed with the catching ability of our current Year 1 children; there's clearly some budding netball and basketball players!

- He painted match stick figures based on those he had seen on the streets
- He loved football and supported Manchester City
- He turned down a knighthood

We have used different materials (mediums) to create our artwork; paint layering paper, graphite and oil pastels.

A Very Busy Half Term

We have had another busy half term in Year 2.

English

In English we have been reading 'Titanic...I was There' by Margi McAllister. We have been learning all about Daisy Hooper's experiences on board the Titanic.

Daisy is a young girl travelling in 3rd class on board the RMS Titanic with her mother and two brothers, Freddie and Edwin.

They are planning to start a new life in America. When disaster strikes and the Titanic strikes the iceberg, Daisy and her family are in a race against time to make it to the lifeboats in time and escape the sinking ship!

History

In our history lessons, we have also learnt about the Titanic Tragedy. We have used lots of the skills that a historian needs to be successful. We thought about what makes an event significant, whilst we have also learnt about primary and secondary sources, and how these can be used to help people understand more about past events.

We explored what life was like for people living in Belfast in the early 20th century, especially those people who would have helped to build the Titanic, and we have also closely examined some of the main reasons why the Titanic Tragedy occurred.




We concluded our history learning by considering what changes have happened to ships as a result of the terrible disaster taking place.



Science

In Science, we carried out a seed growing investigation and thought carefully about what conditions are needed for a seed to grow successfully. We learnt about the different parts of a plant and we have also learnt about the different types of seed dispersal.




TITANIC FACTS

- 1. The **Titanic** lies 12,600 feet underwater.
- 2. The wreckage of the **Titanic** lie nearly 2.5 miles beneath the surface of the ocean, approximately 370 miles off the coast of Newfoundland, Canada.
- 3. The ship broke in two, and the gap between the bow and the stern is about 2,000 feet on the sea bed.

Scholastic Book Fair - Thank You!



The whole of year 5 were commended on their excellent behaviour and invited back next year so very well done children!


Medium Distance Running

In maths this half term, we have consolidated our knowledge of statistics, shape and measures as well as learning about ratio.


PE

Air Aware – Clean Green and Safe

We have had several concerns from the residents in the local community about cars idling outside the school during drop off and pick up times.

Vehicle emissions are by far the biggest contributor to air pollution around schools and are a significant health hazard. Children and babies are the worst affected as they are still developing. It can aggravate conditions like asthma, and recent research from the World Health Organisation shows that air pollution may be damaging every organ and virtually every cell in the body.

Keeping your engine running - the fact and fiction...

- Fiction "Idling doesn't put out a lot of pollution"
- Fact An idling engine can produce up to twice as many exhaust emissions as an engine in motion. An idling car can fill up to 150 balloons with harmful emissions every minute. Switching off your engine can go a long way to improving air quality.
- Fiction "Leaving your car running is cheaper than turning it off and on again"
- Fact It is cheaper to turn off your engine. Sitting in your car with your engine running could cost you more than you think. Between 5% and 8% of fuel use occurs while idling.
- Fiction "It's better to be inside the car than out of it it protects me from the fumes"
- Fact The air quality inside the car can be up to twice as bad outside the car, and is even worse in Winter. Why not try walking or cycling on quieter routes?
- Fiction "I need to keep the engine running to keep the heater on"
- Fact If you park and keep the ignition on, rather than turning the car off completely, the heater should stay warm for up to 30 minutes.

Poor air quality affects everyone - especially children. Remember to switch off your engine!


Staffordshire Sings—Congratulations on your Great Performance!
